

Pasa Puchah Guthi UK, London held its first ever Mohani/Dashain Tuccha Jyajho at Nnewly opened outlet of Momo and Roti in Alperton, London. Vice Presidents Mrs. Menka Shrestha and Mrs Rukmani Manandhar opened the programme with warm welcome and wishes for Mohani/Dashain on behalf of Guthi executive committee.

The full house event, with 60 plus attendees, started with each guests briefly introducing themselves. After everyone was introduced to the crowd, Mr Sandeep Shrestha, General Secretary and Mr Sumeet Bajracharya, sports secretary of Guthi took on their guitars and sang Classic Newah song Wa Maya Wa Wa: for the entertainment of the crow.

Pasa Puchah Guthi UK (PPGUK), London held the annual Mha Puja and Nepal Samvat 1139 new year celebration event on 11th November 2018 at Oakington Manor School, London.

In its 18th year running, the guests were traditionally welcomed by offering Sinha (tika) by Panchakanya as they walked past beautifully designed mandala. They were then handed over with Saga: which included samye-baji on traditional bwota (leaf bowls) and aila (traditional wine) in salincha (clay cups). Whilst executive members Suza Manadhar and Nhyoumila Tuladhar explained the importance of Mha Puja, Vice President Mrs Rukmani Manandhar welcomed all present at the audience.

The full house event with 330 attendees was auspiciously inaugurated by chief guest Mrs Janaki Manandhar, wife of PPGUK founding member late Mr Ishwor Manandhar. Mr Kumar Shrestha, president of Central Coordination Committee extended new year greetings to everyone present. Chief guest Mrs Manandhar released the annual magazine of Guthi which was in the form of a comic book based on the animated movie 'The Legend of Shankhadhar'. Pasa Puchah Guthi UK (PPGUK) London held its second Yomari Punhi event in Wembley, London with nearly 100 members and supporters. Senior executive member Mr Kiran Manandhar welcomed everyone with greetings for Yomari Punhi. Founding president Mr Amrit Ratna Sthapit presented on the importance of 'daana'- the act of giving, and the tradition of giving Yomari during Yomari Punhi.

Kids made their own yomari

15 kids present at the event were given an hour of workshop on how to cook yomari. They participated actively with creative ideas and prepared their own yomaris under the supervision of executive member Ms Nhyoumila Tuladhar. For the adults, a Yomari quiz contest was conducted by General secretary Mr Sandeep Shrestha and Cultural secretary Mrs Pranisha Shakya. While the questions related to the tradition of yomari punhi were prepared by author Mrs Bimal Prabha Bajracharya, Vice-President Mrs Rukmani Manandhar gave away prizes to the winner.

Kids' Computer Game 'Yomariman' launched

President of PPGUK London, Mr Sanyukta Shrestha introduced the audience with a computer game 'Yomariman' titled after a new fictional Nepali superhero. He informed that the game is developed as an entertaining way to educate kids about yomari culture and the importance of charity. Keeping with the tradition of Yomari Punhi, all executive members and guests sang the traditional Yomari song 'Tyo-Chhi-Tyo' led by Nepalbhasha Poetess Mrs Gyani Shova Tuladhar. Over 225 Yomaris were then distributed to all present at the event. Prepared by the executive committee and supported by Mrs Uttara Manandhar, Mrs Gyani Shova Tuladhar, Mrs Anjana Shrestha and Mrs Kriti Pradhan, the yomaris were stuffed with chaku (molasses), khuwa and gudpak.

PADMA RATNA MEMORIAL



Pasa Puchah Guthi UK (PPGUK) London & SOAS Nepal Society jointly organised a memorial event to commemorate the life and contributions of late Dr Padma Ratna Tuladhar on Sunday 20th January 2019 at SOAS University, London. The event attended by 30 guests, including university students of various subjects related to social anthropology and politics of Nepal, was attended by representatives from the Embassy of Nepal in London.

Conducted by Sports Secretary Mr Sumeet Bajracharya, the event started with an introduction of all speakers by President of PPGUK London Mr Sanyukta Shrestha. Secretary to His Excellency the Ambassador, Mr Tejendra Regmi paid heartfelt tribute to late Mr Tuladhar and expressed that he looked forward to learning about Mr Tuladhar's contributions to Nepal from the various presenters of the event who had researched about him.

First speaker of the event, Prof Dr David Gellner from Oxford University presented a character sketch of late Padma Ratna Tuladhar titled 'Padma Ratna, the shy leader'. He shared his valuable experiences with late Mr Tuladhar from the last few decades and some excerpts from his interview from 1996. Second speaker Mr Malla K Sundar elaborated on Padma Ratna's contributions as a political figure and his contributions to Nepalbhasha Movement. Through a video talk, his sharing of lifelong association with Padma Ratna was a valuable learning material for the audience.

Third speaker Ms Sajana Maharjan shared her valuable experience of working with Padma Ratna for more than 13 years in the field of human rights. She shared some of the details of Padma Ratna's ideology within human rights activism and how he rose as a 'mediator of mediators' whilst Nepal went through a peace process after ten years of insurgency period. Fourth speaker, editor-in-chief of Matina Quarterly publication, Mr Shashi Mahaju highlighted on Padma Ratna's contributions to Nepalbhasha literature. He elaborated on Padma Ratna's upbringing which had special contribution to his inclination towards his mother tongue and preferences in filling the gaps in Nepalbhasha literature.

Fifth speaker of the event, former president of PPGUK and Vice-President of World Newah Organisation, Mr Krishna Chakkun highlighted on Padma Ratna's contributions towards the worldwide networking of Newah community. He informed about the history behind formation of World Newah Organisation through an international convention in London in 2011, and Padma Ratna's role in the historic achievement. After a short refreshment break, sixth speaker, former president of PPGUK London Dr Sachetan Tuladhar shared his valuable experiences with Padma Ratna Tuladhar as a family member. He revealed lesser known facts about Padma Ratna's personality as a quiet yet humorous person at home.

Seventh speaker, London-based artist Mr Subash Thebe Limbu, presented his insightful talk titled 'Language and Dissent'. He elaborated on Limbu community parted ways from its mother tongue on the rise of one-country one-language policy during King Mahendra's regime, and how the contribution by prominent activists like Padma Ratna Tuladhar was instrumental in an attempt to improve the situation. Eighth Speaker, Vice President of PPGUK Central Coordination Committee Mr Ojesh Singh delivered his talk titled 'Padma Ratna: A mentor, guardian and an unconventional friend'. He shared his valuable experiences with Padma Ratna since an early age, his learnings from the multi-dimensional personality and some interesting facts about Padma Ratna's personal life and interests.

Ninth and last speaker, PPGUK London President Mr Sanyukta Shrestha presented his talk titled 'Padma Ratna's impact on Nepali youth & the Future of Newah Movement'. His talk elaborated on what made Padma Ratna who he was, the history of suppression in Nepal and its continued form at present. He explained how the face of Newah movement is changing and the youth is playing a major role in redefining it.

The event concluded with a typical Nepali dinner at Great Nepalese Restaurant in Euston, kindly hosted by PPGUK executive member Mr Kiran Manandhar.



Organised in ABI College in Acton, guests enjoyed their breakfast in two sessions for kids and adults, where President of PPPGUK London elaborated on the objectives and structure of the workshops. Also present at the event, one of the PPGUK Founding members Mr Balmukund Prasad Joshi expressed that learning for kids should be in the medium they enjoy and the works of PPGUK London have been exemplary in this direction. Another founding member Mr Arjun Pradhan thanked the parents who travelled from all across UK to help their kids gain the traditional skills.

In the first workshop on Story-telling, executive member Ms Leung Ping read out the story 'Twartwar Prasad' in English which was exclusively written for the event by author Ms Sushma Manandhar to teach the kids the value of love and unity for one's own community. It was also read in Nepalbhasha by culture secretary Ms Pranisha Shakya for an opportunity to the kids to improve their Nepalbhasha listening. Selected kids demonstrated their skills in Minecraft while others learnt the skills needed for building 3D block to design traditional Nepalese architecture in digital platform. automation techniques through computer software.

Interaction with researcher Shobbit Shakya

13th January 2019, London

Mr Shobhit Shakya from Tallinn University of Technology and Governance, Estonia, interacted with Mr Sanyukta Shrestha, the President of Pasa Puchah Guthi UK London. Board of Trustees in Pasa Puchah Guthi UK






In 2008, a day long congregation, First Newah Muna, was held in Wembley where four branches of Pasa Puchah Guthi UK participated - Pasa Puchah Guthi (UK) - London, Pasa Puchah Guthi(UK) - South-East London, Pasa Puchah Guthi(UK) Aldershot and Pasa Puchah Guthi (UK)-Reading.

Since then PPGUK has been successful in forming two more branches, one in Wales and another one, more recently, in Scotland. All these 6 branches of Pasa Puchah Guthi UK is coordinated by a board of Trustees elected from the representatives of each branch and its called Pasa Puchah Guthi UK – Board of trustees(PPGUK-BOT).





GUNLAA PUNHI

Nepal Samvat consists of 12 months in a calendar year. It is based on the lunar calendar which consists of 354 days in a year. Names of months consist of two syllables, in which the last syllable laa stands for month. Those months with their adjacent months in Western Calendar is as below:

Tenth month of Nepal Samvat calendar is Gun-laa. The combination of two words Gun meaning 'forest' and Laa meaning 'month', indicates that it is the month of visiting a hill or forest. With special reference to the Newar Buddhists of Kathmandu, it is the month of visiting the Swoyambhunath, located on the west from the core city of Kathmandu.

Full moon day of each month is considered to be the most auspicious day in the month, due to which many of newah festivals are celebrated or started from the full moon day. Gunlaa Punhi also is not an exception to this. Gunlaapunhi is also known as Gunupunhi of. Gun stands for 'forest', while nhu means 'to step onto'. Similarly, pu is for 'full moon' and nhi means 'day'. So these four syllabic words conveys the meaning of full moon day of the month, of stepping down in a forest or hill. In other words, it is a month of visiting the hill or forest.

Newars are the local inhabitants of Kathmandu valley. Among newars of valley, majority belong to farming community known as Jyaapu. Month of Dil-laa (May/June) is the time for plantation of rice, which is the main crop of the valley. This is known as Sinajyaa or Waa-Piyegu. Once plantation is carried out there wouldn't be much work left on the fields. So the locals take this opportunity to visit different shrines and monasteries around the valley,

in the early hours of the day. While they visit different shrines they play various kinds of traditional instruments as well as sing along religious and spiritual songs. This in turn helps them to be healthy, both physically and spiritually. Among the buddhists newars of the valley, there is also a belief that during the rainy season of Gunlaa, due to the strong weather conditions, monks would stay put at their monasteries. So this is the ideal time to visit them in their monasteries and learn from them, regarding religion and spirituality.

Kwaati

Main dietary consumed on the full moon day of Gunlaa is 'Kwaati'. Kwaa means 'hot' and Ti means 'soup'. Hence, the literal meaning of Kwaati is hot soup. Hot soup that is consumed on this day is made out of 9 different beans and lentils. Although the exact types of beans used varies from one locality to the other, some of general beans and lentils used are: Red bean - Simi, Mung Beans, Chickpeas - Chana, Black Eye Peas - Bhuti, Garden Peas - Kegu, Soybean - Musya, Black lentil - Mya Kyein, White beans - Tuyu Kegu, Broad Beans - Bakala. For the preparation of Kwaati, beans and lentils are soaked for 45 days until they sprout. On the day of Gunlaapunhi they are then cooked as a soup and are served with wheat bread. These beans' soup provide a very high dose of protein which enhances immunity power. Enhancement of immunity power is much needed during this season as the valley and the whole country of Nepal is subject to strong rainy weather conditions.

There is a specific reason for the beans to be of exactly nine different types. In Shankhyaa Darshan - the philosophy of numbers, number nine has the highest value, amongst the single digit number. This number is considered to be related to one's prosperity. On this same day Newahs of Khwopa (Bhaktapur) takes bath for nine times on Lwoon Hiti (Stone conduit), facing east . At the same time they change nine different pairs of clothes, in turn, which is believed to enhance their health and prosperity. Also in Bhaktapur Palace, the royal cow festival (Laaeku: sayaa:) starts on Gunlaa punhi. This series of festivals commences on the full moon day (punhi) and concludes after the ninth day on the bright phase of Bhadra Shukla Navami.





Jona / Janai Chiigu

The Taagaadhaaris of Newars (Amatya, Gurvacharya, Joshi, Karmacharya, Malla, Pradhan, and Rajopadhyaya) receive the sacred thread band on the morning of this full moon day. The process is called Jona chiigu in Nepal Bhasa and Rakshyaa bandhan in Sanskrit. The rest of the Newars receive jona which is made up of a thread coloured with turmeric (halu:) joined with package of preventive measures (Gunu pucah). Gunu Puchah consists of six different items: Mustard seed (I:ka), Roy seed (Pa:ka), Unbroken Rice (Aakhe), Apamarga, Babhu: Swan and Turmeric (Halu:). Gunhupuchah consists of these six items as a means of protection from foreign elements, to the one that is receiving it.

Byaan jaa nakegu - 'Feeding the frogs'

In Kathmandu valley frogs are offered rice and other dishes on the day of Gunlaapunhi. It is believed that when frogs start to croak, it will start to rain. Rain water is very essential for paddy cultivation. Ecologically frogs plays a vital role in maintaining balance in the food chain. Insects such as Swarming Caterpillars, Rice hispas, Grasshoppers and Rice Case-worms are most destructive pest for rice plants. Frogs prey on these insects and act as biological agents in controlling these pests. Similarly, legend of Ghantakarna also states that frog helped people of Kathmandu in captivating the demon Ghantakarna, which ultimately lead to killing of the demon. Because of all these frogs are considered to be an ally and protector of farmers. To show gratitude towards the assistance and protection that farmers receive from frogs, they are fed on Gunlapunhi.

Silu Tirtha

Silu Tirtha is a shrine located in the lap of Mount Ganesha. It is also known as Gosaainkunda or Gosaainthaan. In word Silu, Si refers to Lord Shiva and lu: means 'to find'. Tirtha stands for 'Shrine'. Similarly word Gosaain refers to 'shiva', kunda is 'lake' referring to the lake that is situated in the place, while Thaan refers to 'place of residence'. Irrespective of what name is used to describe the place, these refers it to the shrine where Shiva resides and trip to

which will allow one to discover Shiva.

Shiva is a symbol of 'kalyaan' (welfare) of the people. Shiva-lu: hence means discovery of welfare. Individuals those are physically and psychologically fit, visit Silu Tirtha during the month of Gunlaa. This shrine is located approximately 24 kilo-meters from Kathmandu. The journey of Silu Tirtha is full of adventures, which broadens the knowledge and attitude of an individual. This makes one's life better in terms of livelihood, which makes the trip to Silu Tirtha one of Kalyaan in real sense. Silu mye (Silu Song), a tragic song full of melancholy, from the movie Silu is associated with the trip to the Shrine. The tune is based on the terrain those falls on the route to Silu Tirtha. The echo of the river of Trisuli and tune of the song clearly portrays the pain of journey through the song. Despite the melancholy that is present in the song, it does touch on the general belief that visiting Silu will bring merit in one's life.

Gunlaa punhi and the whole month on Gunlaa hence is important festival as well as period of a year for Newah community. Tradition of visiting various shrines situated in different hills and mountains, in and outside of Kathmandu valley, have been playing a crucial role in physical as well as spiritual well being of Newah Community . The hot beans soup (Kwaati) have also played its part in sustaining the immunity, which is lost during the cultivation as well as affected by the strong weather conditions during this time of year. Receiving jona on this day, which is made up of thread coloured with turmeric and attached with a gunu pucah also provide a sense of protectiveness to individuals throughout the year.

Similarly, as a gratitude towards the role that frogs play in protecting farmers, Jyapuu Newahs also worship and feed frogs on the day of Gunlaa punhi. With the importance that frogs hold in our ecological balance and the alarming rate at which they are diminishing in Nepal, this tradition holds ever more importance in modern day nepal. Finally, the journey of Silu is also undertaken during this month. Adventures that this journey entails, broadens the knowledge and attitude of an individual, which in essence allows them to discover Shiva in real sense in life.

Introduction and Guthi 101

Jwojwolappa..... Jigu naan Sandeep Shrestha kha

I am Sandeep Shrestha and I have completed my first year officially as General Secretary of PPGUK London. If only I had known a year ago that I would be writing an article recollecting my memories of working in the Guthi, then I would have (NOT) done things differently. Everything we have done in the last 12 months successfully or unsuccessfully has been an immense learning opportunity for myself and the team.

Let me take a step back and take you all through my personal journey of how I came to know about Guthi, and what made me join Guthi in 2018. It was in the year 2014 which is now 5 years ago, when I went to Mha Puja organised by PPGUK Aldershot. Incoming Aldershot President Mr. Rajan Malla is someone I have known for a long time as he is my father's good friend from their days in the British Army. That is when I heard Mr. Arjun Pradhan explaining how he and his earnest colleagues/friends founded Pasa Puchah Guthi in London in the year 2000. This was my very first introduction to Guthi overall, when I knew a Newah organization existed in the UK.

Guthi Seminar - the seed of thought

Fast forward 4 months Feb 8 2015, I got a call from Mr. Sanyukta Shrestha, then Gen Sec, now our President. He invited me to talk on a programme – Guthi Seminar 2015. The seminar's theme was "Newahs in British Contemporary Society". I was convinced that I can participate and I presented on "Professional Accountancy – Challenging but Rewarding" at SOAS on the 8th of February 2015 being a Chartered Certified Accountant. I met a lot of likeminded, enthusiastic, friendly people in this seminar. It was here when I first thought that I can also be part of organizations like PPGUK and contribute to the community to achieve its objectives. In my school and university days I have always been prefects, house captains and class representatives, active in sports and musical bands. It was something I was missing in my life in the UK. But may be that time wasn't right for me, or I was not yet ready for it. It didn't happen.

Earthquake and Guthi Teamwork

Earthquake in Nepal in 2015 shook Nepalese not just living in the country but also us living abroad. We were all so sad that it happened to our country in that scale knowing we are never prepared for it. This was the occasion when we came together for one common goal – How to help Nepal in that dire situation. This was also the occasion when I got to know more members of the Guthi and the wider Nepali network not just in London but all over. We worked hard, leveraged our network to help the needy earthquake victims back home.

From 2015 onwards I was volunteering, participating and attending Guthi events. One of my inherent blockers or what made me feel aloof was that I couldn't speak/understand NepalBhasha language. I used to get invited to meetings sometimes, most senior members used to communicate in NepalBhasha, and I used to get quite frustrated.

2018 AGM - the happening

In between July and August 2018, Sanyukta Dai approached me to join PPGUK Executive Committee in the role of General Secretary. I actually didn't know what a general secretary role had to do. After some discussion at home, with everyone's encouragement at home of joining Guthi, I attended the AGM. In the leadership of Sanyukta Shrestha, I joined the Executive committee for London as General Secretary. We started working in the next few days of the AGM as our first event screening a Nepali movie was in 2 weeks of the AGM. Immediately I realized that General Secretary literally means secretary of everything in the sense that the role had to do everything. Thankfully our president Sanyukta Dai has tolerated me and stepped in to help me out a lot of times.

The past 12 months have been a hell of a ride. As general secretary, it took me some time to understand that work before an event i.e. planning well in advance is as important as the execution of the plans on the event day. Dealing with councils in London trying to book venues, abiding by their processes, applying for licenses, searching for best deals of insurance

covers and filling up forms etc. has been quite a challenging task. We organised events every month from September till August this year. We engaged with a lot of London members through our events.

Executive committee

Looking back now, our president started off the 2018-2020 tenure on the right foot by recruiting a very good mix of people. We are very lucky to have experienced Vice Presidents and EC members, and at the same time, young and energetic folks holding other posts. One of the master strokes in my opinion has been the designated role of our Cultural Secretary, we have Pranisha Shakya Ji who is simply amazing.

Our EC team cooked a lot of food, for each and every event, we were cooking something. As important as our EC members, we are very fortunate to have our other halves equally participating in the Guthi. I would not have done half the work I accomplished without my wife Kritishre Pradhan. In fact, on the event day, she worked two times more and better than me, while I would be hosting the event from the stage (which is easy task for me). I would like to thank all our tata's and tataju's, bhenas and jwais of the Guthi EC members who always helped us without complaining.

Side effects

Being in Guthi has had its side effects. What people sometimes forget is, all of us in the EC have our full time day job. There have been times, which I am sure most EC members can relate to, I have worked on Guthi tasks from my office, instead of doing my day job. Time management becomes increasingly difficult by the day. From 2019 summer, I have also been working at the treasurer for the PPGUK Board of Trustees. Juggling full time work commitments, family priorities, PPGUK London activities and PPGUK BOT finances hasn't been easy. But I am lucky to get a lot of support from my Presidents, fellow EC members and family.

Personal growth and sense of satisfaction

Working in the Guthi has definitely made me more patient. I have learnt many interpersonal skills, time management, and prioritization from my leaders in Sanyukta Shrestha and Ojesh Singh. I have enrolled in NepalBhasha class so I am learning to form sentences now. I can write my name in Ranjana lipi. My EC members jokes with me all the time as the one who doesn't know how to speak Newari. It's all fun, we have all become one big family trying our best to preserve our rich culture and tradition, so it doesn't go extinct.

As part of my role, I have to get in touch with our members via email, phone calls or sometimes face to face visits. Although language is a barrier, there have been many moments I have felt quite satisfying, happy and emotional reading email responses thanking our EC members for doing what we do, lots of bhintuna messages, and when people start sharing their personal matters on a phone call, that is a form of validation that I have built a relationship with that person. Blessings from the older generation thanking us for continuing with our efforts is one of my key motivators to continue the work we do.

Future challenges

We have some real challenges in front of us. To continue to achieve our goal, we need to drive more youth participation and convince them to join their respective Guthi chapters. 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
